


"CEO of CEIST, Anne Kelleher, was honoured to officially open the new building extension to St. Mary's High school on Friday afternoon, May 21st, 2010.

Joining the Dots ran for two hours over six Thursday evenings. 14 teachers from a host of different subject areas took part. The programme was facilitated by Amalee Meehan and Margaret Farrell, CEIST.

Joining the Dots is a school based programme. It is an invitation to every teacher in the school, of every subject area, to explore their faith and connect it to their life, especially their work life. Through connecting how God is revealed with the deep desires of the human heart, it hopes to deepen participants' own faith, praxis and relationships – with God, with themselves, and with others - especially in the context of the school community.

There are no fees, no travel and no exams. It involves a maximum of two hours one evening a week for six weeks.

Presentation Secondary School Sexton Street Limerick Win Young Environmentalist Award

Monday 31st May 2010

On the 12th May, 2010, first year students, from the Presentation Secondary School, Limerick, were awarded by EcoUnesco, the Young Environmental Award in Environmental Sustainability. They were the only school in Limerick city and county, to be shortlisted for this national competition. The Presentation students, who called their project 'The Green Buddies' along with 50 other shortlisted schools, attended the Mansion House in Dublin, last Wednesday.



The project started back in October, when their teacher, Helen Ahern,

approached the students and asked if they would be interested in entering the Young Environmental Awards. After expressing an interest in gardening, the project got underway. Neither their teacher, nor the students had any experience in horticulture. The first step was to install a poly-tunnel in the school grounds (thanks to our school care-takers) which grew mainly herbs and some daffodils initially.

These daffodils were later given to St. Josephs Hospital by the students. Mr. Jake Daly helped the students install a water butt and this was then used to water plants. This showed the students the benefits of water conservation in an organic context. A composter was also installed and the students now compost waste from the Home Economics classes.

By March, the poly tunnel proved to be a great success. The students grew the following: runner beans, cabbage, lettuce, strawberries, parsley, onions, sunflowers, chives, leeks, sweet pea etc. When some plants ripened, they were then sold to teachers and parents and the proceeds are now re-invested into future gardening projects.


Besides the poly-tunnel, the students wished to renovate the school grotto. The students worked hard for five days, clearing weeds and they prepared the soil for planting. They put in flowers, ferns and heathers and finished off their excellent work by planting two weeping birch trees. The end result was much admired by the visitors to the school and by the judges at the awards ceremony.

Their teacher, Miss Ahern, spoke of the delight with their win. "These girls worked very hard on this project, and developed a genuine interest in horticulture. The fact they were one of only ten school categories to receive an award in Ireland is testament to that. When they visited Seed Savers in Scarrif last month, their teacher was particularly touched by one student's remark, "Miss, if you asked me a year ago where food came from, I would have said a supermarket, now I know it comes from the ground".



Deputy Principal Ann Dollard. School caretaker Joe Donlon had found stuff under the stairs "going back years," she revealed. By the way, Ann herself is a past pupil of the school. Maiden name O'Reilly, she was, believe it or not, reared in the prison. Her father was the Governor.

Parents' Council members Mary Burke, Deirdre Fennell and Yvonne O'Reilly organized the reunion. Mary Delaney also greeted guests. From the school the past pupils went to the nearby SS Peter and Paul's Church for Mass and then to the Heritage Hotel for refreshments and more chat.

Bantile, a Banagher, Co Offaly, firm, built Scoil Chríost Rí in a section of the convent gardens. It opened on September 15, 1968, not long after the introduction of "free" secondary education. The brains behind the project was the far-seeing Mother Columba - she'll always be "Mother" to people of a certain age. Happily, she is still with us.

She, it was, who introduced girls' second-level education to Portlaoise in what was known as a "Secondary Tops" school. Past-pupils of that school, Mary Carmody and Ann Scully, were at the reunion.

Mary, from Mountmellick Road, sat her Leaving Cert in 1962. Her uncles, the renowned Lalors the wheelwrights, lived at Bridge Street.

Ann, also a member of an old stock local family, completed her Leaving in 1966. She was, so to speak, under the eyes of the nuns. She was reared at Church Avenue, just across the road from the Presentation convent and schools. After an absence of 35 years she has returned to live in Portlaoise.

The convent, alas, is now sightless, abandoned and a prey to vandals. The Presentations Sisters began their work in Portlaoise, then Maryborough, in 1824.

Sr Marie Therese King was the last nun to serve as Principal of Scoil Chríost Rí. Her successor is the current holder of the post, Helen O'Donnell. The first lay Principal of the school was Ann Young. Valerie Turley also filled the position for a period. All were invited to the reunion.

Although having achieved many soccer All Ireland's in the past this was the first Gaelic All-Ireland win for Eureka.





The essence of Challenge to Change is embraced in the fact that this is not a competition in which there are winners and losers.




By virtue of their participation each group has brought an awareness to their school and local community of some
